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Welcome to our latest weekly newsletter. I hope that you have all had a restful half term and are fully charged for what is going to be a busy few weeks ahead. We are delighted that we will be welcoming staff and students back into school during a staggered return for students from Monday 8th March. Parents have been provided with some outline detail of how the return will work with further information to be circulated at the start of next week. Students return dates are as follows:

- Monday 8th March: Year 11 & Year 12/13 (6th from students to arrive on site at 1:00pm unless arriving in the morning on school transport)
- Tuesday 9th March: Year 10
- Wednesday 10th March: Year 9
- Thursday 11th March: Year 8
- Friday 12th March: Year 7

The whole team have been working incredibly hard to ensure that everything is prepared to re-open the school site safely and that we are able to undertake the Lateral Flow Testing (COVD-19 test) for all students who have consent. Systems will change following the first week of term when students will then receive home testing kits and be asked to report any results. Consent is only needed for testing completed in school as the home testing system will be managed separately.

Please note that from next week there will be some lessons where staff are not available to deliver live lessons as they will be involved with onsite activities to prepare for Monday 8th, work will still be available via Satchel One (staff will indicate if there will be no live element). In English, for one of these sessions students will be invited to undertake some 'reading for pleasure' as part of activities to coincide with World Book Day (Thursday 4th March).

Can I again thank all families for their ongoing support and for their regular feedback which has enabled us to listen and respond throughout the period of lockdown; the positive partnership working between home and school has contributed significantly to the success of all!

We were so pleased to receive all of the photos of students involved with activities on our 'Catch -Up and Innovate' day which was held on the last day of term, a significant effort was made by everyone (more detail inside).

I know that everyone will be looking forward to being back in school; with the testing regime required the first few days are going to feel a little different, although we will quickly adjust to the daily routines which were in place last term and can all look to the future for greater normality. We have started to receive more answers from the Government on how we need to plan for key year groups and we know that students will continue to respond brilliantly with their normal positivity and determination to do the very best they can.

We look forward to seeing everyone shortly; for students ... keep completing the great work from home and start to get prepared for your return!






ART

ART - Guess the Artist studied in Year 7.

ARTIST 1:

- 1. Who am I? Born in 1840 this artist was a French painter, a founder of French Impressionist painting and famous for 'plein air' landscape painting.
- 2. Challenge Questions: In 1912 he was diagnosed with a cataract in both eyes and the condition reflected on his work. His paintings showed a change, with the use of whites, greens and blues shifting towards "muddier" purple. What did he start to paint at this time and what is the famous garden where he lived and painted?

ARTIST 2:

- 3. Who am I? He was a Norwegian painter and his best known work, The Scream, has become one of the iconic images of world art and can be seen as a symbol of modern spiritual anguish.
- 4.Challenge Questions: 'The Scream' is not actually just one picture but a series, but how many pictures were created? The painting title is not as most people think based on the person in the picture (who is not shown actually screaming) but what was the inspiration?

ARTIST 3:


- 5. Who am I? This artist was an American artist. She was known for her paintings of enlarged flowers, skulls New York skyscrapers, and New Mexico landscapes. She was one of the first female painters to achieve worldwide acclaim from critics and the general public.
- 6. Challenge Questions: She has been recognized as the Mother of what Art movement? In 2006 something was discovered in New Mexico and was named after her but what was it?

FINAL QUESTION: Who painted the most expensive painting sold at auction and how much did it sell for?

Year 7 Ava Phillips










ART



SPORTS

Well done to all the competitors again this week, we seem to have had more entries than ever! As the competition is in its final 2 weeks, the scores are getting really important. Thank you again to the parents and guardians who have had to cope with their children throwing balls or socks around the house...again! It will be over soon, I promise! Participants have all received a point for each section of the challenge you completed again. For the winners of each section, a bonus 5 points were awarded that go towards their own and the form/house total. Therefore, some people could be on 20+ points now. You can find out the top 3 places for boys and girls in each year below. Only 44 points separate the Y7 for competition from 1st to 5th place, so there is all to play for next week! There are only 11 points between 1st and 3rd place in the house competition in Y8 too, as Westgate jumped from 3rd to 1st position this week! In the overall house totals, it's a close race for 1st between Friary currently in the lead and Castle, hot on their heels. But it is also getting close between 3rd and 4th place Northgate and Westgate. What will next week bring?!

There were 3 sections to the challenge for week 4. A question section made up of 2 questions relating to shooting in basketball and netball.

In basketball different points are scored depending on where you shoot from.

1. Try to label 3 different places that a player can shoot from and how many points they will score from that position.

In netball you are only allowed to shoot in a particular area and only certain players can shoot.

2. Try to label the players who can shoot (just the initials are fine) and the area they are allowed to shoot in.

Followed by 2 shooting accuracy tasks. One lying on your back and trying to perform as many repetitions of the shooting action as possible and catch them in 1 minute. This was done with the left and right hand. Then in a seated position. Then finally a shooting at a target challenge over 2 minutes outdoors using a wall or hoop/basket.
