Therefore, it was Callum's first time competing over 200m in the pool. Despite this being his first attempt at the distance in a competitive race, he won his heat and

In case you haven't guessed the novel yet... it is set in Narnia and there is a lion called Aslan: there are two film versions, but the book is much better – of course!



Year 9 Prosthetics STEM class

Students in 9xy/Sc1 participated in a special STEM (Science Technology Engineering Maths) challenge in the final week of term, organised by the Smallpiece Foundation, in which they were challenged to make a prosthetic hand. This construction project involved cutting and attaching small pieces together to make a working hand, in a limited amount of time. The students rose to the challenge wonderfully and there were many excellent models made. Prosthetics is a field of STEM which is growing very rapidly and the technology can be used not only to replace injured or missing limbs, but also as a way of augmenting our strength. This was a fascinating insight into this field – if you are interested in finding out more, there are currently only two University courses in this subject (BSc Prosthetics and Orthotics) at Salford University (in Manchester) and Strathclyde University (Glasgow).

Wild, windy wonderful Wales

A level Geography fieldtrip

Our Geography residential trip for Year 12s and 13s began early on a November morning at Oldbury Wells from where we travelled up to Adventure Parc Wales to experience for ourselves one of our A level case study locations. This diverse regeneration project includes a Hilton hotel, a spa, indoor ninja assault courses and caving, zip lines and the world's first artificial surfing lake. Usually, this unique tourist destination is a hive of activity, but sadly we were unable to see it in full swing, or enjoy our planned lunch at the Hilton. Just a few days before our visit, the government had taken over the resort to prepare it for housing asylum seekers. Talk about geography in action! None the less, the resort's seemingly unflappable sales manager and the chief engineer still gave us a great tour around. We made up for missing out on the Hilton highlife by playing ping pong and retro Pacman, with one student discovering the delights of pinball for the very first time!

In the evening we stayed at Bangor University halls of residence - with some sixth formers cooking elaborate creations for each other in 'Come dine with me' style, whilst others were a little less adventurous, resorting to the student staple – Pot noodles!

Thursday saw us travel up to the stunning coastline around Rhosneigr to study the beaches and sand dunes, supporting our A-Level students with their geography fieldwork skills. It was a bit wild and windy, but thankfully the rain held off and it was relatively warm so we had a busy day collecting lots of data.

On the last day the wild Welsh weather was in action again! We stopped off first at the easy to pronounce town of Llanfairpwllgwyngyllgogerychwyrndrobwllllantysiliogogogoch for some souvenirs (including a Christmas sheep!) and a quick photo, then onto the beautiful Newborough beach. Whilst the sun did make an appearance, the wind was unrelenting. It certainly meant our A-Level students could see for themselves how the wind causes the movement of sand and the creation of dunes, however too much sand was getting blown onto us – so after recording some incredible wind speeds on the anemometers, we beat a hasty retreat back to the minibus. We journeyed back to school via other A level case study locations such as Zip World and the Rhug Estate, which was on TV a week later in 'Britain's Poshest Farm Shop', however the Year 13s appreciated it for their bison themed slides!


