Have a great holiday and thanks for all your hard work in Science!



National Apprenticeship Week

Lots on offer, keep your eyes open as to what is available.

This week we promoted National Apprenticeship Week which included a talk to Year 12 by OWS alumni Chloe Bailey who is completing a degree level apprenticeship with Capgemini. Chloe is also speaking to Year 10 in assembly following half term.

Miss Silverstone is running targeted sessions to Year 11s interested in Apprenticeships and T-levels. Students will also be streaming into content from the Marches Career Hub on local apprenticeship providers in areas of interest to them.

There have been lots of events happening including virtual events that students can access at home, a selection of which are outlined below; remember to keep an eye out on social media channels for more information.

There are a few really great local ones that have been advertised this week which are aimed at school leavers with a start date of September 2024. Expect to see more vacancies that are open to school leavers coming on in the next few months - from childcare to business admin, to dental nursing to agriculture, to catering to legal administration, to IT and many more.





They have learned how proteins look when denatured and coagulated.


Year 11: Enya Moorcroft

Uniform Policy

A reminder of school uniform policy

The uniform policy is available on the website however, for further reference please see the additional guidance below to help you when purchasing unbranded items of uniform.

Uniform Policy

Skirts – standard mid-grey skirt. To be worn no shorter than two inches above the knee (see below)







Shoes – plain black **polishable** leather or simulated leather, please see examples.



No boots, canvas shoes or trainer style shoes are permitted. No branded sports <u>makes</u> including (but not limited to) Nike, Adidas, Reebok, Converse, Stan Smiths and Vans. Please see below examples of **prohibited shoes**:



Socks – plain black, white or grey, no trainer socks. Tights – plain black no patterns.

Coat – A black or grey waterproof coat.

Hoodies and Sweatshirts are prohibited from school

Trousers – should be formal, mid grey, full length and either regular or tailored fit (see below)



Jeans, tracksuit bottoms, cropped trousers, chinos, leggings, or skinny fit trousers are prohibited (see below)


